The Lucille Lortel Award for Outstanding Achievement Off-Broadway is named for LUCILLE LORTEL, fondly known as "The Queen of Off-Broadway," among whose many productions have been the landmark revival of The Threepenny Opera, which is credited for putting Off-Broadway on the map, Brecht on Brecht, Jean Genet's The Balcony, the 1964 Off-Broadway American premiere of Athol Fugard's The Blood Knot and 20 seasons of the ANTA Matinee Series (1956 to 1976) initiated due to the frustration caused by the 7-year run of *The Threepenny Opera* in her theatre on Christopher Street as well as 42 seasons of new works way Off-Broadway at the White Barn Theatre in Westport, Conn., where in 1947 she pioneered and proved the dramatic viability of the staged-reading for audiences that kept coming back for more of the avant-garde, experimental, not-strictly-commercial theatrical fare. Four of her recent consecutive quintet of Tony® Award nominees started Off-Broadway: Angels Fall, As Is, Blood Knot, Sarafina! and A Walk in the Woods, which she initially produced on Broadway and then presented at The Library of Congress, co-produced on London's West End starring Sir Alec Guinness and Edward Herrmann, and took the original Broadway cast of Sam Waterston and Robert Prosky to Moscow, U.S.S.R., where she is now known as "The Czarina of Gorky Street." Miss Lortel has received virtually every theatrical award and honor—beginning with the first Margo Jones Award in 1962 through the inauguration at the Graduate Center of the City University of New York in 1989 of The Lucille Lortel Distinguished Professorial Chair in Theatre, the first theatre chair to be named for a woman, and continuing most recently with the opening of The Lucille Lortel Room of the Theatre On Film and Tape Archive in the New York Public Library for the Performing Arts at Lincoln Center.

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
