The Lucille Lortel Award for Outstanding Achievement Off-Broadway is named for LUCILLE LORTEL, fondly known as "The Queen of Off-Broadway," among whose many productions have been the landmark revival of The Threepenny Opera, which is credited for putting Off-Broadway on the map, Brecht on Brecht, Jean Genet's The Balcony, the 1964 Off-Broadway American premiere of Athol Fugard's *The Blood Knot* and 20 seasons of the ANTA Matinee Series (1956 to 1976) initiated due to her frustration caused by the 7-year run of The Threepenny Opera in her theatre on Christopher Street as well as 45 seasons of new works way Off-Broadway at the White Barn Theatre in Westport, Conn., where in 1947 she pioneered and proved the dramatic viability of the staged reading for audiences that kept coming back for more of the avant-garde, experimental, not-strictlycommercial theatrical fare. The American premiere of August Wilson's Fences was the first play sponsored by the Lucille Lortel Fund for New Drama at Yale, an endowment she established for the ongoing production of new plays at Yale Rep. Four of her recent quintet of consecutive Tony® Award nominees started Off-Broadway: Angels Fall, As Is, Blood Knot and Sarafinal; and A Walk in the Woods she initially produced on Broadway, presented at The Library of Congress, and coproduced in London's West End starring Sir Alec Guinness and Edward Herrmann. Then she took the original Broadway cast of Sam Waterston and Robert Prosky to Moscow, U.S.S.R., where she is now known as "The Czarina of Gorky Street." Miss Lortel has received virtually every theatrical award and honor including the first Margo Jones Award (1962), the Lee Strasberg Lifetime Achievement in Theatre Award (1985), the Women's Project Exceptional Achievement Award (1986), the 1989 inauguration of The Lucille Lortel Distinguished Professorial Chair in Theatre at the Graduate School of the City University of New York (the first theatre chair to be named for a woman) and induction into the Theatre Hall of Fame (1990). She received Honorary Lifetime Membership from the New England Theatre Conference "in recognition of her outstanding contribution to theatre in New England, the country and the world" (1991), the Life Achievement Award from The Christophers and, two days later, the Kennedy Center Medallion "for meritorious achievement" from the American College Theatre Festival (1992) and an Honorary Doctorate of Fine Arts from CUNY on May 25, 1993. The September 1993 Greenwood Press publication of Lucille Lortel: A Bio-Bibliography by Sam McCready has been celebrated with book parties at the Westport Public Library and at the New York Public Library for the Performing Arts at Lincoln Center, where a permanent tribute to her career is on display in The Lucille Lortel Room of the Theatre on Film and Tape archive (the home and viewing facility for TOFT's collection of more that 1,000 tapes of live Broadway, Off-Broadway and regional theatre productions).
