#### CLOSING REMARKS

The Actors' Fund of America, founded in 1882, is the only national social services organization that serves the entire entertainment profession. The Fund provides services from its headquarters in New York City, its regional offices in Los Angeles and Chicago, its Nursing and Retirement Homes in Englewood, New Jersey, and the Aurora supportive housing residence on West 57th Street in New York City. The Actors' Fund recently assumed management of the Actors' Work Program, which serves people from its offices in NY and LA. The Fund serves over 3,400 people a year, with an annual operating budget of \$13 million. In addition to providing emergency grants for essentials such as food, rent and medical expenses, The Fund offers a comprehensive roster of programs designed to meet the unique needs of members of the entertainment profession. The Fund offers counseling, mental health services, a chemical dependency program, senior and disabled services, nursing home care and retirement housing, affordable supportive housing ,and a comprehensive AIDS Initiative. In response to the changing needs of the entertainment community, The Actors' Fund is implementing a number of new initiatives, including the Phyllis Newman Women's Health Initiative and the Artists' Health Insurance Information Center.

The Lucille Lortel Awards for Outstanding Achievement Off-Broadway are named for LUCILLE LORTEL who made her Broadway debut in the 1925 Theatre Guild production of George Bernard Shaw's Caesar and Cleopatra which starred Helen Haves. Her other Broadway performance credits include Belasco's The Dove with Holbrook Blinn and Judith Anderson: The Great Gatsby with Florence Eldridge and Fredric March; the ingenue in One Man's Woman; the leading role of 'Elsa' in the "sex play" The Virgin Man opposite Dorothy Parker's husband, Alan Campbell; and she succeeded Mary Duncan as 'Poppy' in the national tour of The Shanghai Gesture with Florence Reed. She was Sessue Havakawa's leading lady in The Man Who Laughed Last which opened at the Palace in New York and then played the Orpheum circuit (1928-1929) before it became one of the first "talkies" produced by Warner Brothers in 1930, starring Sessue Hayakawa and Miss Lortel. Among her more than 500 productions have been the landmark 1955 Tony® Award-winning revival of Marc Blitzstein's translation of Bertolt Brecht and Kurt Weill's The Threepenny Opera which is credited for putting Off-Broadway on the map; Brecht on Brecht adapted by George Tabori; Jean Genet's The Balcony; the 1964 American premiere of Athol Fugard's The Blood Knot; Sean O'Casey's Cock-A-Doodle Dandy, I Knock at the Door and Pictures in the Hallway; Berlin to Broadway with Kurt Weill, A Musical Voyage directed by Donald Saddler; Tom Cole's Medal of Honor Rag; Marsha Norman's Getting Out; Mbongemi Ngema's Woza Albert!; Wells' Gertrude Stein and a Companion; Jane Anderson's The Baby Dance and Larry Kramer's The Destiny of Me as well as 20 seasons as artistic director of the ANTA Matinee Series (1956-1976) which she initiated when The Threepenny Opera ran for almost 7 years at her theatre on Christopher Street. The Matinee Series yielded several

productions that went to Washington, D.C., where in 1962 Richard Coe, drama critic for The Washington Post, dubbed her "the Queen of Off-Broadway" when she presented Edward Albee's Fam and Yam at the Library of Congress (from a subscription season that had included plays by Conrad Aiken, Samuel Beckett, Eugene Ionesco and Yukio Mishima). Last Summer she celebrated the 50th Anniversary of the White Barn Theatre in Westport, Connecticut, where as founder and artistic director, in 1947 she pioneered and proved the dramatic viability of the staged-reading to audiences that kept coming back for more of the avant-garde, not-strictly-commercial, experimental, theatrical including the American premieres of Sean O'Casey's Red Roses for Me, Eugene Ionesco's The Chairs, Samuel Beckett's Embers, Murray Schisgal's The Typists, Paul Zindel's The Effect of Gamma Rays..., and Terrence McNally's Next. The American premiere of August Wilson's Fences was the first play sponsored by the Lucille Lortel Fund for New Drama at Yale Rep. Four of her recent quintet of consecutive Tony Award nominees started Off-Broadway: Lanford Wilson's Angels Fall, William M. Hoffman's As Is, Athol Fugard's Blood Knot, Mbongemi Ngema's Sarafina!; and Lee Blessing's A Walk in the Woods, she initially produced on Broadway, then presented at the Library of Congress (the 19th of a distinguished series of dramatic productions and seminars), and co-produced in London's West End starring Sir Alec Guinness and Edward Herrmann. In May of 1989, she took A Walk in the Woods to Moscow, U.S.S.R., with the original Broadway cast of Sam Waterston and Robert Prosky. Miss Lortel has received virtually every theatrical award and honor including the first Margo Jones Award (1962); the first Lee Strasberg Lifetime Achievement Theatre (1985);in Award 1989 inauguration of The Lucille Lortel Distinguished Professorial

Chair in Theatre at the Graduate Center of the City University of New York (the first theatre chair to be named for a woman); and induction into the Theatre Hall of Fame (1990). She received Honorary Lifetime Membership in the New England Theatre Conference "in recognition of her outstanding contributions to theatre in New England, the country and the world" (1991); The Christophers' Life Achievement Award and, two days later, the Kennedy Center Medallion from the American College Theatre Festival (1992); an Honorary Doctorate of Fine Arts from CUNY (1993); the 1996 Honorary Irwin Piscator Award, and recognition from the Columbia University School of the Arts "for her long and distinguished career supporting new and innovative work for the theatre and her crucial role in the development and ongoing success of Off-Broadway theatre" (April 1996). On April 27, 1996, she was present for the inauguration of the Lucille Lortel Fellowship in Playwriting at Brown University at which time an exhibition on her career opened in the Liv Ullmann Lobby of the Stuart Theatre on the Brown campus. She was one of the first individuals to be inducted into the Greenwich Village Hall of Fame in October 1996, and in November received the Helen Hayes Award (presented to her by Miss Hayes' son, James MacArthur) at the 14th Annual Helen Hayes Awards Gala benefiting St. Clare's Hospital, NYC. During the month of February 1997, the exhibition on her career was mounted in the lobby of the Miller Theater at the Colombia University School of the Arts. On November 17, 1997, Arthur Miller delivered the first Lucille Lortel Lecture on Playwriting at Columbia University in conjunction with the professionalplaywright-in-residence program supported by a grant from Miss Lortel in her continued efforts for the development of new playwriting talent. In December Miss Lortel was honored by the Lee Strasberg Theatre Institute with plaques

installed in the New York and Los Angeles schools commemorating "her vision and generosity in making possible the preservation of The Lee Strasberg Lecture Archives," and she received The League of Professional Theatre Women/NY's Lifetime Achievement Award at a party held at Sardi's on December 16th. On Friday, April 17, 1998, His Eminence John Cardinal O'Connor presided over the dedication and unveiling of a plaque naming the Lucille Lortel Lobby at St. Clare's Hospital and Health Center, 415 West 51st Street in New York's Theatre District. September 1993 Greenwood Press (Westport, Connecticut) publication of Lucille Lortel: A Bio-Bibliography by Sam McCready was celebrated with a book party at the New York Public Library for the Performing Arts at Lincoln Center, where a permanent tribute to her career is on display in The Lucille Lortel Room of the Theatre on Film and Tape Archives (the home and viewing facility for TOFT's collection of more than 2,100 tapes of live Broadway, Off-Broadway and regional theatre performances including 30 productions at the Lucille Lortel Theatre among which are Mrs. Klein starring Uta Hagen which Miss Lortel co-produced; Alan Zweibel's Bunny Bunny: Gilda Radner a sort of romantic comedy: and Douglas Carter Beane's As Bees in Honey Drown, currently running at the Lucille Lortel Theatre.)

The Edith Oliver Award for Off-Broadway Excellence is established to honor the individual who best embodies the high level of artistic achievement as defined by Ms. Oliver's criticisms for The New Yorker during her more than a quarter of a century as drama critic. This year we establish the Edith Oliver Award for Off-Broadway Excellence to honor the achievements of the New Yorker Drama Critic and great friend of Off-Broadway. She joined the New Yorker in 1947. In 1961 she began a 32-year run as the magazine's theatre critic. Edith had no patience for sham, pretension, or pomp! She had her own notions of what good acting and good plays were. Bad acting and bad plays made her angry. She was a great champion of the budding black theatre of the 1960's and '70's. She spent her summers working with young actors and playwrights and the O'Neill Theatre Center in Waterford Connecticut.

Jane Alexander - In 1968. Ms. debut Alexander made her Broadway in The Great White Hope with James Earl Jones, directed by Ed appearances Subsequent Sherin. include First Monday in October with Henry Fonda, produced by the late Roger Stevens, The Visit and, most recently The Sisters Rosensweig. 1993 she was nominated by President Clinton and unanimously confirmed by the Senate to become the sixth Chairman of The National Endowment for the Arts, a post she held until the completion of her four-year term this



past October. Honour marks her return to Broadway. Ms Alexander has performed in numerous productions at theatres in Atlanta, Boston, Chicago, Philadelphia, Los Angeles, Indianapolis and Washington, D.C. as well as New York. She has been nominated for six Tonys, receiving the Award for The Great White Hope. She was inducted into the Theatre Hall of Fame in 1995. Honour marks Ms. Alexander's reunion on stage with Robert Foxworth after a 30 year hiatus. As Company members at Arena Stage in D.C., they appeared together in over a dozen plays. In addition to her stage work, Ms. Alexander has appeared in 40 television Favorites include playing 'Eleanor Roosevelt' and feature films. opposite Edward Herrmann as 'FDR' in the Mini-series "Eleanor and Franklin," "Calamity Jane" and "A Marriage: Georgia O'Keeffe and Alfred Stieglitz", both of which she also produced. She has been nominated five times for the Emmy and won the award for "Playing for Time", also starring Vanessa Redgrave. Outstanding among her feature films are the four for which she received Academy Award consideration: The Great White Hope, All the President's Men, Kramer Vs. Kramer and Testament. Ms. Alexander is married to Ed Sherin, who has directed her in many plays and films and who is executive producer of the NY based TV series "Law & Order". Her son, Jace Alexander, is also a successful director, who has yet to direct his mother in anything.

Arthur Miller was born in New York City in 1915 and studied at University of Michigan. When he graduated in 1938 he began work with the Federal Theatre Project and wrote radio plays and the Cavalcade of for CBS America. His plays include All My Sons (1947), Death of a Salesman (1949), The Crucible (1953), A View from the Bridge and A Memory of Two Mondays (1955), After the (1964),Price(1968).The Creation of the World and Other Business (1972), and The American



Clock (1980). He has also written a novel "Focus" (1945). "The Misfits", which was filmed in 1960, and the text for "In Russia" (1969), "Chinese Encounters" (1979), and "In the Country" (1977) three books of photography by his wife, Inge Morath. His most recent works are Salesman in Beijing (1984); Danger: Memory! (1987); Timebends, a memoir (1988); The Ride Down Mt. Morgan (1991); The Last Yankee (1993); Broken Glass (1994), which won the 1995 Olivier Award for Best Play; and a novella, "Homely Girl, a Life" (1995). A film version of The Crucible directed by Nicholas Hytner and starring Daniel Day Lewis, Winona Ryder and Paul Scofield was released in 1996. A View From the Bridge starring Anthony LaPaglia recently completed a run at the Roundabout Theatre and is now at the Neil Simon Theatre on Broadway. He was awarded the Avery Hopwood Award for Playwrighting at University of Michigan in 1936. He has twice won the New York Drama Critics Circle Award, and has received two Emmy awards and three Tony Awards for his plays. Mr. Miller has also won an Obie Award, a BBC Best Play Award, the George Foster Peabody Award, a Gold Medal for Drama from the National Institute of Arts and Letters, the Creative Arts Award from Brandeis University, the Literary Lion Award from the New York Public Library, the John F. Kennedy Lifetime Achievement Award, the Algur Meadows Award, and, most recently, the Pell Award for Excellence. He has received honorary degrees from Oxford University and Harvard University and has been awarded the Pulitzer Prize. Signature Theatre Company is proud to dedicate its 1997/98 season to Arthur Miller - exploring his prolific body of work, spanning 1941 to 1998. Works presented this season include a major revival of The American Clock; the two-one act plays The Last Yankee and I Can't Remember Anything directed by Joseph Chaikin; and the World Premiere of Mr. Peters' Connections directed by Garry Hynes Signature also presented readings of Mr. and starring Peter Falk. Miller's only children's story, "Jane's Blanket" (1963) and his first radio play "The Pussycat and The Expert Plumber Who Was A Man" (1941).

Theatre Development Fund is please to have participated in A.R.T./New York's Passport to Off-Broadway Month culminating with the Lucille Lortel Awards. TDF, now the largest not-for-profit service organization for the performing arts in the United States, was established in 1968 to foster serious theatre and to help provide affordable theatre tickets to those who needed them. Since then, TDF has played a unique role in strengthening New York City's performing arts. It has filled over 48 million theatre seats; supported over 600 plays, including 15 Tony Award® winners and 20 Pulitzer prize honorees; and returned over half a billion dollars in revenue to theatre, dance and music organizations. TDF's intensive arts education programs, Stage Doors and RA.P. and student theatre newsletter written for and by New York City high school students, Play by Play, are helping to build tomorrow's audiences.
